SSNAP Pilot feedback

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Background to data collection and input

- Stroke Unit based at St Thomas' Hospital in central London
- Inputting co-ordinated and completed weekly by senior clinicians (CNS, OT, PT, SLT, Diet, Psych) on a rota. Around 1 in 3 weeks
- All therapy disciplines responsible for inputting own minutes
- Different data collection modalities across therapy teams. Not centralised









Perceived benefits of the SSNAP dataset changes from pilot

- Aligns with new stroke guidelines
- Realistic reflection on actual interventions received by patients
- Creating a unified way of recording across a large team centralised at a ward level
- Existing clinical team taking greater ownership of inputting data increasing compliance of locking cases





Challenges during the pilot

- Initially double counting of therapy for joint sessions
- Initially unclear definitions of each category –Improved with help notes / ongoing consensus picture
- Unable to receive reports on individual therapies to understand each service
- Inducting new rotational staff to think in "categories" in addition to an unfamiliar audit
- During pilot senior staff estimating categories for each therapy, rather than upskilling all staff as not inputting their own data





Works in progress/ learning from pilot

- Highlighted challenges at local sector level co-ordinated approach.
- Development of SSNAP project manager and admin team
- Developed Excel Spreadsheet to overcome challenges
 - Prepopulated formulas provide reports per therapy discipline
 - Summary tab provides live reports (similar to quarterly reports)
 - One centralised workbook for all therapists
 - Using comments to indicate joint sessions to avoid duplication of inputs ie knowledge of each session





Summary and shared learning

- Therapists inputting individual data provides good oversight of challenges and possible solutions
- Many of the challenges were overcome through local collaboration and with SSNAP team directly
- Having a cohesive therapy team is key to finding sustainable solutions without duplicating effort
